1. This bird is red, yellow, and blue and has a strong, curved beak to crack hard nuts and seeds. It can also mimic sounds.

2. These domestic birds are a breed that originated in Germany and can commonly be found on farms for their eggs, meat, and feathers.

3. This bird has been the national bird of the United States since 1782. Despite what its name suggests, it has a fully-feathered head.

4. This bird can be found in extremely cold temperatures! Males of this species are mostly white, while females are more speckled to aid in camouflage.

5. These giant birds have a wingspan of 10 feet and can soar for up to an hour! They live in the Andes Mountains along the western coast of South America.

6. This bird may look like an ostrich, but it is smaller and found in South America. Similar to the ostrich, this bird cannot fly!
